UPD REPORT ▪ Detective Cheryl Lenzer

The month of October was a little busier this month compared to last year. We had a total of 170 calls come in for Big Cottonwood, 9 more than last year. The majority of calls were for general calls for service. Most notable were the 6 calls for Camping, 3 for Dogs, and 2 for Swimming in a Watershed, 4 Search and Rescue calls, 4 Citizen Assists, 3 Traffic Accidents, 5 Traffic Enforcement calls, 1 Welfare Check, 2 Vehicle Burglaries, 1 DUI, 2 Suspicious, and 1 Hit and Run. There were two proactive enforcement details. I don't have the total number of Parking Notices served as it's a holiday and MSD was not in. On Sept. 20 the UPD Motors conducted speed enforcement in the area of 6100 E Big Cottonwood Canyon and issued 12 citations.

I don't have the statistic maps, as they have not been processed. I will send them out as soon as I receive them. The canyon patrol officers are getting ready for winter, we are training our newest officers in off-road vehicle recovery, avalanche training, and beacon training. UDOT has said they will be doing the sticker program again and indicated there may be overtime opportunities for officers to come in on those canyon restricted days and enforce the tire rules.

BUSINESS

- Illegal trash disposal is becoming an increasing problem that will result in rate increases for all customers. Suggestions from board members and the public include publicizing Springback Mattress Recycling Company, Free Dumpsters for BCC homeowners, and starting up a Community Cleanup Day.
- Carolyn reported the Police and Sheriff's office must separate. Basically, services that were shared will now have to be separated. The cost of separation is expensive, and our taxes for policing service will probably go up. They want the separation is less than eight months, July 2024.

- Residents expressed concern about the upcoming traffic/parking problems as the winter season approaches. There will be more information soon about the new reservation systems being planned by Brighton Resort, Solitude Resort, and the Town of Brighton.

The yellow Resident Passes could be important this year. Most of the canyon above Willow Heights will be open by reservation only from 7 am until 1 pm. So, if a resident goes to town in the morning and returns before 1 pm, it's likely they will need to show the bright yellow Resident Pass. Time will tell, however, as we navigate these new plans. The Town of Brighton will make Resident Passes available to those who need them (text Jane Martain at 801.554.1007 or Barbara Cameron at 801.694.9045). They have not changed from past years, so be sure to keep the ones you have in your glove box.

UDOT will begin clearing avalanches in the canyon at 6 am, instead of 8 am as in past years. This means that anyone who needs to be in town before 8 am should leave the canyon by 6 am.
